



Arts Partners Survey Results 2004-2005

Executive Summary

Thirty-five (35) member organizations of the DC Arts and Humanities Education Collaborative, Inc. responded to a survey on their various types of partnerships with the District of Columbia Public School System for the 2003-2004 school year. The DC Arts and Humanities Education Collaborative, Inc. consists of over 60 member organizations, of which many are arts organizations working diligently in arts education within the District of Columbia Public School System.

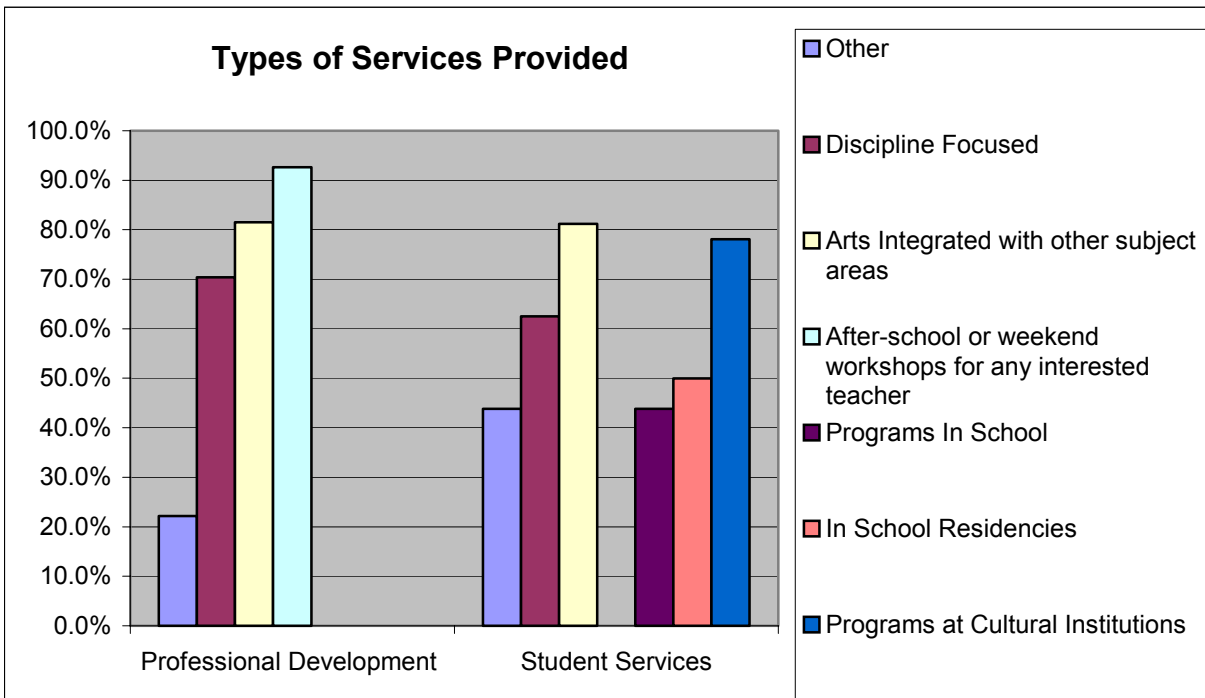
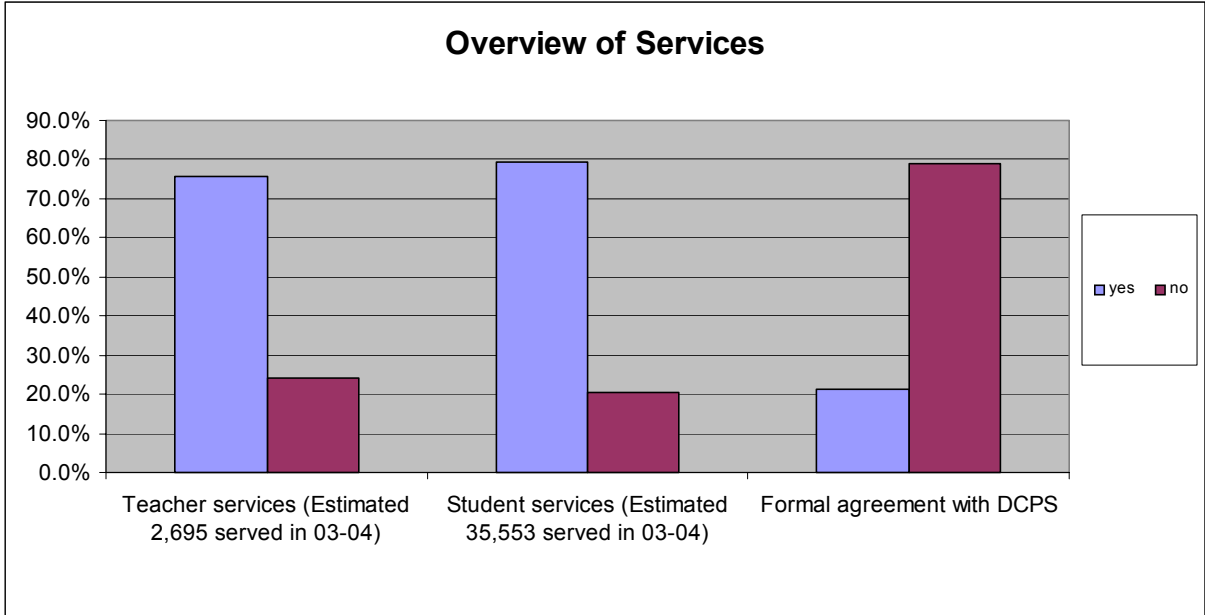
Survey results revealed that 79.4% of respondents provided direct services to students. Student services included: exhibits or performances at cultural institutions or in the community, in-school exhibits or performances (one-day programs), and in-school residencies (two or more days, sequential programming). Of these services, 62.5% were discipline focused and 81.2% were arts-integrated with other subject areas.

In addition, 75.7% of the organizations revealed that they provided professional development opportunities for teachers. Types of professional development programs provided were after school or weekend workshops pertaining to various subjects, discipline focused and/or arts integrated with other subject areas. Arts integrated with other subjects resulted in a 92.6% ranking amongst the organizations for professional development training with teachers. Organizations reported providing services to, on average, 250 teachers.

In response to whether the organizations had a formal agreement or contract with the DC School District to provide arts related services and/or activities, over 75% stated that they did not have a formal agreement. Of those who responded that they did have a formal agreement, those agreements were not with central administration or with a content specialist, but more on an individual basis with the school.

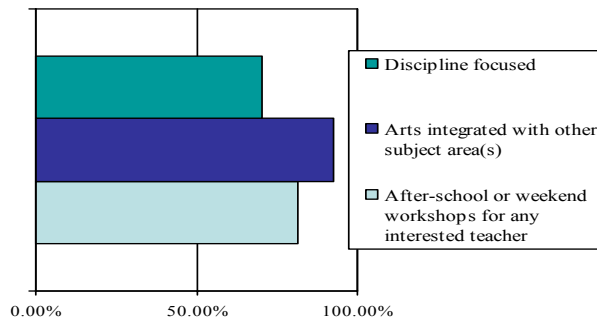
